

Kresen Kernow (formerly Cornwall Record Office), Reference: AP/C/1985 W, Inv.

Abstract of the Will of Robert Curnow of the Parish of Towednack in the County of Cornwall, Yeoman, written 8 Mar 1684/5, proved 25 Nov 1685.

Gives 5 shillings to the poor of the parish of Towednack.

Gives to **his son Robert Curnow** a mare, a metal crock, a metal pan and board.

Gives to **his son Michael Curnow** the strawberry mare and the black mare colt, a pan called Roswall pan, and a crock called Roswall crock.

Gives £40 to his **daughter Curnow**.

Gives £40 to **his son William Curnow**, to be paid to him when he turns twenty-one.

Gives £40 to **his son Richard Curnow**, to be paid to him when he turns twenty-one.

Gives £40 to **his daughter Jane Curnow**, to be paid to her when she turns eighteen.

Gives 1 shilling each to his godchildren.

Gives to **his son Peter Curnow** a tenement called Terean Rose Amall, and a moiety of a tenement in Embla.

All the rest of his goods and chattels he gives to **his wife Catern Curnow** and to his son Peter Curnow, appointing them co-executors of his last will and testament.

An inventory of the goods and chattels of Robert Curnow of the parish of Towednack, deceased, was taken on 27 Jun 1685 by Matthew Stevens of the borough of St. Ives and Robert Curnow of Towednack. Total value: £196 14s. 8d.

Robert Curnow 'the Elder' was buried in Towednack on 28 Jun 1685.
